CHANGES SINCE LAST UPDATE



- An increase in snow totals across north-central and northeastern NC
 - A longer duration of sleet could cut down on snow totals in areas south & east of the Triangle
- An increased threat of freezing rain across eastern NC
 - 0.1-0.2" of ice accumulation across central portions of eastern North Carolina
- Slightly earlier onset of precipitation this afternoon
 - Widespread travel issues are still not expected until later this evening and overnight

Possible Winter Weather Impacts

Light rain and snow showers will develop this afternoon across western and central NC. Little or no accumulation is expected. Greatest travel impacts will not begin until later this

evening.

FRI NIGHT

A mix of rain/snow/sleet during the evening will transition to snow overnight from northwest to southeast. Southeastern areas will see a longer duration of rain/sleet before transitioning to snow. Heaviest precipitation will move in after 10:00PM.

SAT

With the exception of far southeastern NC, all areas will have transitioned to snow by mid-morning. The heaviest precipitation will continue through the late morning. Snow showers will taper off during the afternoon from west to east.

SAT NIGHT

Snow showers may linger into the evening hours across northeastern NC.

Dangerous travel conditions will persist overnight as roads refreeze with temperatures falling into the teens across the state.

SUN

Mostly sunny skies, but temperatures will struggle to climb above freezing. Temperatures will fall into the single digits Sunday night with clear skies expected.

- Winter Storm Warnings are in effect for much of the state beginning at 7:00PM tonight
- Slight changes to the track & temperature forecasts will greatly affect accumulations
- The duration of sleet and freezing rain mixing with snow will alter snowfall amounts
 - More sleet = less snow; less sleet = more snow
 - Freezing rain accumulations up to 0.2" possible across the far Coastal Plain
- Hazardous travel is likely beginning this evening and through Saturday night. Lingering moisture will refreeze Saturday night, causing slick spots Sunday morning.






FRIDAY NIGHT LOW TEMPERATURES






SATURDAY HIGH TEMPERATURES




